With his \$50,000 match, and the generosity of 168 donors, we raised more than \$257,000 to support the vital services we provide at no cost to the community!

PREVENTION SPOTLIGHT: TEEN DATING VIOLENCE PREVENTION

Teen dating violence affects more teens than many people realize. Throughout the month of February we recognized Teen Dating Violence Prevention Month as a time to raise awareness, start conversations, and help young people build safe, healthy relationships.

A healthy relationship requires open communication, safety, trust, and respect. Teaching children and young people about healthy relationships and consent should start early with age-appropriate messages through childhood and teen years.

Healthy teen relationships are built on:

- Respect for boundaries
- Honest communication
- Trust and equality
- Feeling safe, both emotionally and physically

Red flags to watch for include:

- Extreme jealousy or controlling behavior
- Pressure to share passwords or location
- Isolation from friends or activities
- Fear of upsetting their partner
- Constant texting or monitoring

If something feels off, it probably is. Teens who experience dating violence are more likely to struggle with anxiety, depression, or low self-worth, are more likely to become isolated from friends and family, and are more likely to experience future unhealthy or abusive relationships. Dating violence isn't only physical, it can also be emotional, verbal, digital, or controlling.

9TH ANNUAL MULTIDISCIPLINARY TEAM CONFERENCE

Kay Phillips Child Advocacy Center coordinates a Multi-Disciplinary Team (MDT) of professionals who come together and work collaboratively to effectively investigate, prosecute, and treat child abuse.

Each year, the center hosts a free conference on child abuse and neglect to provide specialized training for MDT members. On October 29th, more than 125 MDT professionals from Berkeley and Dorchester Counties attended the 9th Annual MDT Conference at the Lowcountry Conference Center in Summerville.

Attendees heard informative and illuminating presentations concerning the investigation and prosecution of child torture and corroborating evidence. Speakers included Victor Vieth, Chief Program Officer of Zero Abuse Project; Director, Deana Lashley, MBS, D.O. and Advanced Practice Provider, Erin Hart, DNP, FNP-BC from MUSC Child Abuse Pediatrics; and panelists, Stephen Young, Chief of Police of the Dorchester County Sheriff's Office, Susan Arms, Human Services Specialist from Berkeley County Department of Social Services, and KPCAC staff member, Millicent Fowler, Director of Clinical and Forensic Services – Dorchester.

A POSITIVE IMPACT STORY

A client came to our center after experiencing child sexual abuse with concerns for commercial sexual exploitation (CSEC) and began Trauma-Focused Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (TF-CBT) with one of our qualified therapists.

When this client first began therapy, she rarely looked up. Shame and low self-esteem shaped how she saw herself and how she moved through the world.

But she kept showing up. Week after week, she put in the work. She challenged herself, even when it was hard.

Her family noticed the change first. They told her therapist they were beginning to see the daughter they remembered from before everything happened. She was more driven, hopeful, confident, and most importantly, she was happy again.

By the end of treatment, she could see the change in herself too. On the day she graduated from therapy, she shared that she once believed she would never finish high school. Now, she was going on college tours and planning for her future.

She hadn't become someone new. She had been given the tools she needed to cope with her trauma, allowing her to find her way back to who she had always been.

She also reflected on her forensic interview, describing how heard and comfortable she felt throughout the process. That experience mattered. Being listened to helped her begin telling her story and begin her journey toward hope, healing, and empowerment.

TF-CBT is an evidence-based treatment for children who have experienced abuse/neglect or any traumatic experience. GRIEF THERAPY OFFERINGS AT KPCAC

Staff Member Spotlight: **TAYLOR CONROY**



Taylor Conroy, LMSW is a Lead Forensic Interviewer and Therapist at Kay Phillips Child Advocacy Center. This past year, she identified a need for specialized therapeutic services for youth experiencing grief, and completed training to expand her expertise. She is currently listed in The Hackett Center for Mental Health's Trauma and Grief (TAG) Directory as the sole provider in the state of South Carolina to offer these critical services.

Taylor has dedicated her career to fostering hope, healing, and empowerment since 2017, when she first began serving at the SafeHouse Center in Ann Arbor, Michigan. There, she provided compassionate care to survivors of domestic violence and sexual assault through both a 24/7 crisis hotline and a residential shelter.

After obtaining her Bachelor of Arts degree in Psychology, with a minor in Crime and Justice, from the University of Michigan in 2018, she relocated to Stony Brook, New York where she received her Master of Social Work degree at Stony Brook University School of Social Welfare in 2021.

In January 2022, Kay Phillips Child Advocacy Center proudly welcomed Taylor as a Forensic Interviewer and Therapist. Since then, she has advanced to the role of Lead, all while pursuing extensive continuing education to expand her service offerings. Two of these evidence-based therapies include:

Trauma and Grief Component Therapy for Adolescents (TGCTA):

Evidence-based treatment for teens ages 11 to 21 who've experienced trauma and loss, helping them manage distress and emotional challenges.

Multidimensional Grief Therapy (MGT): Evidence-based treatment designed to help bereaved children and teens move past unhelpful grief reactions and develop healthier ways to cope after a loss.
